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Introduction: Anti-Semitism on U.S. College Campuses

- There has been a rise in anti-Semitic sentiment across college campuses in the United States
 - Arguments against classifying attacks as "hate crimes"
 - Jews are not classified as a "racial group"
 - Jews have a degree of acceptance and success in American society that other racial groups may not
 - White Passing
 - ▶ No "institutionalized racism" against Jews
 - ► The experiences of Jewish students have not been widely studied
 - Small population
 - Success of American Jews in society

Introduction: U.S. Nursing Licensure Programs and Discrimination

- Increasing amounts of discrimination and microaggressions in nursing schools
 - ► Approximately 38% of the U.S. population identifies as a non-White ethnic minority
 - ▶ 19.4% of the nursing workforce identifies as coming from a minority background
 - Schools are attempting at attract more minority students but hostile classroom and clinical environments may make minority student retention difficult
 - Racial and ethnic minority nursing students
 - Male nursing students
 - Disabled nursing students

Research Question

What are the experiences of Orthodox Jewish nursing students enrolled in a pre-licensure nursing program?

Methodology

- Recruitment Procedures
 - ▶ Convenience sampling
 - the Orthodox Jewish Nurses Association (OJNA)
 - Snowball sampling

Methodology

- Data Collection
 - ▶ The bulk of data collection took place in November 2023.
 - Electronically signed informed consent forms
 - Demographics questionnaire
 - 60 minute Zoom interviews
 - Semi-structured interview questions
 - ▶ The average interview 30-40 minutes long
 - Audio recorded
 - Zoom platform recording transcription
 - Otter.ai transcription software
 - Participants sent a \$10 Amazon.com gift card

Results

Research Question 1: What are the experiences of Orthodox Jewish nursing students enrolled in a prelicensure nursing program?



Findings

Seven themes were identified in the data

- The experience of feeling other on campus
- Perceptions of others
- Expressing Judaism on Campus
- Requiring religious exemptions
- Connecting with peers on campus
- Responding to questions about religion from others
- Experiencing campus life post the Israel-Hamas war of October 7, 2023

Theme: The experience of feeling other on campus

- Religious needs separate participants from peers
 - "Balancing two worlds"
 - "I'm the only one who's different"
 - "We can talk about other things"
 - "Where's the line?"

Theme: Perceptions of others

- Representing all Jews
 - "We have so much against us"
 - "I don't want to give the impression that I think I'm too good to talk to you."
 - "Make a kiddush Hashem anytime that you can"
 - "You are representing a lot more of a people than I would say the average person is."

Theme: Expressing Judaism on campus

- "I want to show that I'm serious about [Judaism]"
- " 'Why does she have to, like portray her religious beliefs out like for everyone to see?'."
- "Find the nearest broom closet."
- Desire to drop out?

Theme: Requiring religious exemptions

- Emailing professors
 - ► Positive experiences
 - ▶ Negative experiences
- Embarrassment
- "[Making up] holidays that don't exist"
- Scheduling/studying difficulties

Theme: Connecting with peers on campus

- Making friends with Jewish vs. non-Jewish peers
- Friendships stay on campus?
- Affecting one's connection to Judaism?
- Participating in on campus events

Theme: Responding to questions about religion from others

- Educating peers
- Advocating for other Jews
- Stereotypes of Jews in pop culture
- Microaggressions
- Finding humor

Theme: Experiencing campus life post the Israel-Hamas war of October 7, 2023

- "It was almost as if, to the world, this did not happen. No one's life was affected, nothing changed."
- Social media posts by peers
 - How do you interact with people who post harmful things?
- Safety concerns on campus
- Harassment?

Conclusions

Positives and negatives practicing Judaism on campus

Practicing Orthodox Judaism created a separation

Viewed as the "Jewish student"

Forming working relationships and friendships with their peers

Room for improvement on supporting a diverse student body

Expressing pride in their decision to become nurses

Findings in the Context of Previous Literature



Students may view their Jewishness as something to be hidden (Alperin, 2022; Cieslik & Phillips, 2021; Sasso et al., 2022).



Religious minority students find a balancing point. (Amini & Nguyen, 2021; Carter & McMillian-Bohler, 2020; Cieslik & Phillips, 2021; Parham, 2020).



Religious minorities on colleges campuses may struggle with practicing on campus (Hashem et al., 2022; Manejwala & Abu-Ras, 2019).



Minority nursing students reported experiencing race related comments on campus (Carter & McMillian-Bohle, 2020; Flateland et al., 2019; Kim et al., 2022; Metzger et al., 2020; Pusey-Reid et al., 2022; Serrano et al., 2023).

Participants interviewed reported minimizing their Jewish identity.

Participants formed connections on campus, while remaining true to their Jewish values

Participants reported planning ahead

Participants reported experiencing religion related comments from both their peers and nursing school professors.

Limitations

- Only focused Orthodox Jewish nursing students
- Northeastern region of the United States
- Small sample size
- Private dwellings
- Interviewed within two months of the October 7th, 2023 Hamas attack on Israel

Improving Subsequent Research

- Include participants from other regions on the U.S.
- Explore stress levels
- Explore sense of self identity
- Explore community support
- Explore on campus life after March, 2024

Recommendations

- Increasing cultural competency and sensitivity training
- Increasing the education provided to nursing school administrators and faculty
- School administrations providing education to the professors on the names and times of year of various Jewish holidays
- Providing education about Jewish holidays
- Creating a private space for students of all faiths to use to engage in religious practices
